





Alaska soon seems to be the answer to their prayers, but as winter approaches and darkness descends, Ernt's fragile mental state deteriorates and the family begins to fracture. *The Great Alone* is a daring, beautiful, stay-up-all-night story about love and loss, the fight for survival, and the wildness that lives in both man and nature."
