Looking Towards Sunday

"Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb." – John 20:1

Loved ones:

A few weeks ago – at the start of our conversation concerning the Sabbath day -- I posed this question: "What is the first day of the week in your world?" I encouraged you to Google it and go to God with it because your answer will tell you something about how you're predisposed workwise and worship-wise.



My sermon "research" revealed that Sunday is the first day of the week for roughly half *the* world. Monday is the first day of the week for the other half. 67 countries and over 4 billion people start the week on Sunday. 160 countries and roughly 3.3 billion people start on Monday.

In fact, let's revisit the ingredients of gladness that Chef Rev. Fredd shared last Easter during the confetti-infused children's message.
